# AN INTRODUCTION FROM THE NEW EDITOR OF *THE PHOTOGRAM*

As the new editor of *The Photogram*, I would like to introduce myself and tell you about our plans. First, it's been a pleasure serving on the MiPHS Board of Directors for the past three years and I look forward to my new assignment as editor. I have been a collector of tintypes for almost a decade with a focus on those made before 1880 and I have searched extensively for both images and material on the history of the tintype. In the process of that research I became fascinated with the technology of photography and published *American Photographic Patents: The Daguerreotype & Wet Plate Era, 1840-1880* (Carl Mautz Publishing, 2002). I have also been a professor of art history at Oakland University for 27 years. So I bring to this new position a long commitment to education and a relatively new enthusiasm for American photography.

You may have already noticed in this summer broadside a new look for *The Photogram*. While keeping our classically-designed seal, the newsletter will now have a new masthead and the text and illustrations will be computer formatted. This will make layout faster and printing easier. There will be four regular 12-page issues during the fall and winter months and a short summer broadside like this one to keep you up-to-date with photographica trade shows and MiPHS events.

The line-up of articles for 2003-04 is an exciting one. The September issue begins with an article on the role of the cyanotype in women's colleges at the turn of the century by Sabine Ocker (who will be presenting the topic at PhotoHistory XII at George Eastman House in September) and an essay by Claude Baillargeon on Oakland University's fall photographic exhibition "Dickensian London." November will follow with an article by Eaton Lothrop on "Four American Twin-Lens Reflexes," and the hunt for the Gloucester Massachusetts street tintyper by Phil Storey. In February Len Walle will treat us to an article on "Chasing the Light: Nineteenth-Century Astronomical Photography and Its Pioneers," and Greg and Bernadette Zemenick will recount how they discovered a daguerreotype camera. An article by John Cameron on the paper stereoviews by nineteenth-century French photographer Claude-Marie Ferrier and one by Thomas Featherstone will round off the year in April.

# SUMMER PHOTO EXHIBITIONS IN CHICAGO & CLEVELAND

If you were unable to attend the Daguerreian Society meeting in Kansas City in 2001, you will have a second chance to see 160 fabulous daguerreotypes from the Hallmark Photographic Collection. Called "Unknown Maker: The Art of the American Daguerreotype," the dags will be on exhibit at the Art Institute of Chicago from June 21 to September 28. The Cleveland Museum of Art has two summer photo exhibitions. The "History of Japanese Photography" is an exhibition of 180 photographs, books, scrolls and albums. It runs from May 25-July 20. It consists of 22 images dating from 1850-1911, including works by Southworth & Hawes, Timothy O'Sullivan, William H. Jackson and Thomas Eakins. 
## **NEW MIPHS DUES POLICY**

### PATENT FILE NO. 36,283

By the fall of 1859 the photographic carte de visite had



made its way from Paris to New York City. Its format  $(2\frac{1}{2} \times 4 \text{ inches})$  required a new kind of presentation and albums were quickly introduced to hold the new card photographs.

On August 26, 1863, John Dean (of the firm Dean & Emerson) from Worcester, Massachusetts, was issued a U. S. patent for a frame expressly designed to

display the fashionable card portraits. Named the "Improved Patent American Carte Porte." a die press was used to stamp out the decorative frame and window opening from one thin sheet of copper. On the inner sides of the opening were flanges capable of being folded back to hold the image in place. (The manufacture of the "carte porte" was



similar to Dean & Emerson's foil brass mats patented two years before.) The above example has retained its light green product advertising card. The printed engraving of a bald eagle and patriotic shield suggests Dean & Emerson's support of the Union during the Civil War. Frames measured  $3\frac{1}{2} \ge 5\frac{1}{2}$  inches.
