Dear MiPHS Members,

I'm anticipating another exciting year as Editor of *The Photogram.* Thanks to the generosity of MiPHS members we have a wonderful line-up of articles to look forward to.

We begin in September with a very special issue of *The Photogram.* It will celebrate our 35th anniversary by featuring items from the collections of MiPHS members. Their descriptions will give us an insight to the range and depth of our photographic collections.

There was another program where a photographer sat in a camouflaged tent for nine hours a day for three weeks just to watch a South American bird's mating dance. Talk about having a lot of patience for a few minutes of film. It was a stupendous performance by the bird, but the female wasn't pleased and flew off.

This year's Photographica Show & Sale on October 14th is already in the planning stages. Along with goodies from the Naslanic sale, the Yanik family has donated small camera items from their parents' long gone Detroit store. So please mark your calendars now.
